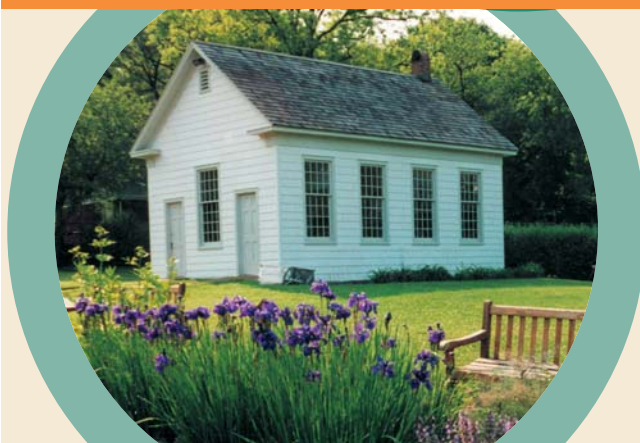

Grades 2 - 5

Long Island Long Ago

Travel back to Long Island in the year 1850! Students will learn about farm life at mid-century. They will practice chores using historic tools, climb aboard a farm wagon, study genre paintings for clues about everyday life and even learn a 19th century dance.

Grades 4 - 6

Wagons West

Experience the hopes and fears of a 19th century family preparing to leave their farm to travel to a new life in Oregon. Students will help the family pack, then visit authentic vehicles to learn about overland travel to reach the “jumping off point” at St. Joseph, Missouri. They will explore our emigrant wagon outfitted as a “prairie schooner” and meet a blacksmith to learn about wagons and wheels. Finally, they will pack a model schooner with everything needed for the six-month journey on the Oregon Trail.

The New Nation: The World of William Sidney Mount

Teachers may choose from two versions:

Social Studies Focus

Follow in the footsteps of William Sidney Mount! Students will study his paintings along with maps, diaries, and letters to learn about transportation, politics and business in 19th century America. Using original documents, they will plot his actual routes through Manhattan and Long Island.

Art Focus

Step into the studio of one of America's foremost painters! Through documents, students will learn about Mount's background and training. In the Art Museum, they will explore his self-portraits, landscapes and genre paintings. In the studio segment, students will sketch a still life and mix their own paints to complete it.
